University Students *Gather* from across *the Country*

Five years ago 100 students from around Canada gathered in the basement of St. Francis de Sales Church in Burnaby for the first ever RiseUp! the annual Christmas conference of Catholic Christian Outreach.

Since then, the conference has travelled to Ottawa, Edmonton, Saskatoon, and Toronto, gradually gaining momentum before making its return to Vancouver this year from Dec. 28 to Jan. 1. Over the past five years the movement has expanded significantly, and this year the conference attracted 400 students from across Canada.

The conference attracted George Weigel as a keynote speaker as well as speakers Father Tom Rosica, CSB, CEO of Salt and Light Television, and Msgr. Gregory Smith of the Archdiocese of Vancouver.

For CCO, RiseUp! 2005 is light years ahead of where it was five years ago, a sign of the rapid growth the movement is experiencing.

"I tell students newer to CCO that once they go to RiseUp! they'll want to go to every single one," said SFU student Jessica Shin. "You get the best New Year's party in the country."

From humble beginnings at SFU, CCO has grown.

"Every year I feel more and more convicted in my role as a missionary on my campus and am encouraged when I see so many students take up the call to evangelize."

Dedicated to Catholic evangelization and leadership development on university campuses across Canada, CCO's RiseUp! conference gives students a chance to meet with hundreds of their peers who are also trying to live out their faith and evangelize.

"It's hard to go to something like this and not gush about it," said Msgr. Gregory Smith, who spoke on the second night of the conference. "When it's CCO, it's okay to gush."

Msgr. Smith was a key supporter of the movement when it was first invited to Vancouver by Archbishop Adam Exner, OMI, in 1998 to assist with the Catholic community at Simon Fraser University.

The movement had humble beginnings when it first started up at SFU, hosting a single faith study on campus and employing a single staff member. However, since then it has grown significantly by expanding to Douglas College, increasing its staff to seven, and hosting over 50 small group faith studies across the city last semester.

Many of the students in those faith studies also attended the conference, which is meant to build up and encourage students and challenge them to share their faith.

The conference was

well received by attendees and was augmented by a heavy dose of praise and worship, a night of Eucharistic adoration, a New Year's party, small workshops, and daily Mass.

There was even a roarily funny Arnold Schwarzenegger skit by CCO staffer Rob Kraemer to provide some levity.

Perhaps the most original session was a commissioning service on the third night of the conference, during which attendees were given a small crucifix blessed by Pope Benedict XVI. The students were challenged to take the cross with the idea that they would one day give it to a person they had helped lead to Christ.

"The commissioning ceremony was memorable for me because we each received a crucifix blessed by our Holy Father," said SFU alumnus Aiden Wickey. "We were instructed to pass the cross on to someone in need in the future, and one talk during Rise Up! opened my eyes to the need for evangelization in China, and so I hope to one day give my crucifix to

someone in China."

CCO has been encouraging evangelization in students like Wickey since its humble beginnings in Saskatoon in 1988, when it was founded by Andre and Angele Regnier at the University of Saskatchewan. The couple, who had been involved in Campus Crusade for Christ, wanted to provide a similar ministry for Catholics.

The Regniers began CCO by going onto campus with a few photocopies and a lot of ambition. Eighteen years later the movement has grown to a staff of 25 people and has expanded to Regina, Vancouver, Ottawa, and Halifax. The movement is now guided by CCO president Jeff Lockert.

In his address to the 400 students present for the conference Lockert quoted the last two Popes as he exhorted his captivated audience.

"The Church is young; the Church is alive," he said, quoting Pope Benedict XVI. "Do not let that hope die; stake your lives on it! We are not the sum of our weaknesses and failures; we are the sum of the Father's love for us and our real capacity to become the image of His Son."

Many students were greatly encouraged by Lockert's exhortation and the conference as a whole, but recognized that the road to campus evangelization and personal holiness as a young person is full of potholes.

"It's not easy to rise up, and God knows that," said Jennifer Padrinao, an SFU student. "I left this conference feeling blessed with true friends, and I'm ready to rise up now."

Padrinao said she recognized the inevitable pitfalls that would come in faith and life after the conference but added, "Now I can do all of that with God and with others." ♦

Road to 2.0.0.8

For many athletes, the year 2008 holds an important event: the Summer Olympic Games in Beijing, but Canada will also play host to an historic and important world event: the 49th International Eucharistic Congress (IEC) in Quebec City from June 15th-22nd, 2008 (www.cei2008.org).

This event is extremely significant for the Church in Canada. 2008 marks the 400th Anniversary of the founding of Quebec City. The arrival of the French in Québec City also marks the beginning of the Catholic Church north of Mexico. People with strong faith settled there and were joined shortly thereafter by the first Recollect and Jesuit missionaries and by the first religious congregations of women, the Ursulines and the Augustines. All of us can trace our faith to these roots in Quebec City.

This significant event will draw thousands from around the world, like a World Youth Day. Pope Benedict has also announced that he would like to preside during the concluding Mass.

As a movement, CCO is taking many opportunities to prepare for this historic gathering. This roadmap to 2008 was announced on New Year's Eve at Rise Up in Vancouver. We began by distributing a basic information booklet to all our members about the IEC. As well, we announced that the next Rise Up Con-

ference will take place in Quebec City in December of 2006. This will provide a concrete opportunity for CCO students to learn about the foundations of the faith in Canada in the place it was founded.

Another step on the journey towards 2008 will include a CCO Impact Canada summer project for 2007. Impact Canada is a summer experience where 50-70 students gather to receive formation and training, live in community, and participate in active evangelization so that at the end of the summer they have a vision, a desire and the necessary skills that will assist them in their desire to have a spiritual impact on their campus and country. The location for the 2007 Impact Canada will be announced simultaneously in each region at the Fall Retreats happening September 8-10th, 2006.

We recognize that it is providential that Canada is able to host the IEC following in the wake of World Youth Day 2002. During the WYD, CCO invested itself completely in service. As we travel on the road to 2008, we will fully invest ourselves in the preparation for and service of the International Eucharistic Congress. As we approach this moment in history, we have the privilege to rediscover the spiritual foundations of our Church and our country. We must not miss this great opportunity. ♦

Put out *into the Deep*

Growing up, I had a typical Catholic upbringing. My family went to Mass every Sunday, I received all my Sacraments and I took occasional catechism classes, but I had yet to make this faith my own.

In my later teenage years, my mom was diagnosed with breast cancer and over the next three years, she went through chemotherapy and radiation treatment. During this time of struggle, her faith only got stronger. I was really moved by her devotion in the midst of all her suffering, and that led me to more questions, and so I began to search. I found myself looking into various Eastern practices and ideologies. In spite of all this, however, there was something about Catholicism that I could not stray from. I was looking for something flashy; something really concrete.

Feeling unfulfilled in my search for God, I looked more closely into the faith that my mom had within the Catholic Church. Soon my faith became more of a quest for knowledge than anything else. I started to spend a lot of time trying to learn all about the Church, the liturgy, reading spiritual writings by the Saints. I would get frustrated because even with all this learning, my faith didn't seem to be going anywhere.

After Christmas, I took part in the Rise Up 2005 conference. On the bus ride there, we read a passage from the gospel of Luke which really struck me.

Jesus said to Simon, "Put out into deep water

and lower your nets for a catch." Simon said in reply, "Master, we have worked hard all night and have caught nothing, but at your command I will lower the nets." When they had done this, they caught a great number of fish and their nets were tearing.

Just like the fishermen, I had been getting discouraged and I felt like there was nothing more I could do, but Jesus asked them to put out into the deep and I too was ready to go deeper with Christ. Rise Up would prove to be a perfect opportunity to do just that.

Everything about Rise Up was incredible and had a huge effect on me. The talks were all very inspiring and meant a lot to me. It was very encouraging to have a chance to talk with so many other young people who had committed themselves to Christ, share stories and experiences, and just have such a great time in a good, Christ-centred environment.

At the end of the second day, we spent an evening in Eucharistic Adoration. Over the course of that evening, I was able to, for the first time in my life, completely place my trust in Jesus and hand myself over to His will for me. I was able to experience a real, personal, powerful relationship with Jesus Christ. I was able to "behold the lamb of God, who takes away the sins of me, Matthew." I finally understood what I had been missing all this time. I fell before the Lord present in the Eucharist and prayed to commit my life to Him.

On the third evening, each participant was given a small Crucifix which had been blessed by Pope Benedict XVI. The speaker explained to us that it was being given to us on loan and that one day we were to give it, in turn, to someone coming into the faith. We were each given an individual blessing of commissioning for evangelization. I had never thought of myself as someone who could evangelize. I always felt that I had not been given the gifts I would need to evangelize, that it was someone else's job, but that night I came to realise that I had it backwards. I thought that I was supposed to do good with God's help; but in fact it is He who does the work through me, if I put my trust in Him. One speaker at the conference said, "God does not call the qualified; He qualifies the called." I knew in my heart, that with God, I could do that which I considered impossible.

Since the conference, I have been actively involved with CCO at the University of Saskatchewan. I was given the opportunity to really stretch myself to meet new students, to boldly share my faith with others and even give my testimony in front of a large crowd at a CCO event. These are all things that I would never have even dreamed of doing, yet because of the personal relationship I now have with Christ, I can do these things out of complete love and joy. I have finally realised what it means to experience a personal relationship with God, and with Him, I have nothing to fear. ♦

The Fruit of Prayer

“Unless the Lord builds the house, the workers labour in vain”

For the past number of years, our weekly small group faith studies have been very fruitful in evangelization. These studies have between 3-10 participants and last between 6-10 weeks.

Week 5 is the most important—the week of conversion. The previous four weeks have been leading up to this critical moment. After the 5th week, small group leaders meet with each participant individually to offer support and encouragement in their faith. Students are invited to make a personal commitment to Jesus Christ through repentance of sin; sacramental confession; renewal of their Baptismal promises, prayerfully opening their hearts to Christ and making the decision to become His disciple. To have enough prayer support for this week we launched a new initiative called 24-7: 24 hours of prayer for 7 straight days.

Cheryl Lina, originally from Toronto, has spent the past five months serving on the Vancouver VINE Project. She wrote the following testimony as an encouragement for all those who participated in the 24-7 prayer initiative last fall.

Theresa arrived for our faith study's first lesson with a spirit of enthusiasm. Despite being a baptized Catholic she had never experienced a personal relationship with God and did not fully understand how that was possible.

As the weeks went on Theresa developed a deeper interest in the material and began asking more questions. It was exciting for me to see her enjoying the study and I anticipated leading her through the fifth lesson knowing that I would be inviting her to accept the message of the Gospel and begin a deeper, personal relationship with Christ. During the fifth lesson she was quieter than usual. Her silenced sparked my curiosity.

The following week I met with Theresa for the one-on-one fifth lesson follow-up. The first thing she said to me was “for the entire weekend I have been reflecting on the lesson we just did and I am SOOOO buzzing!” There was a sound of excitement in her voice that I had never heard before. She shared with me that she left the study in deep thought. For two days she pondered the words, “Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door I will enter his house and dine with him, and he with me” (Revelations 3:20). She could not sleep. Lying in bed she envisioned her heart as if it were an actual door and Theresa asked her-

self “what is behind the door that is scaring me?” She then realized that there was nothing on the other side of the door of her heart that should scare her. “Jesus was not trying to break down the door, but is knocking and was asking [her] if He was allowed inside”. She understood that it was her choice to make and no one else could force her into having a personal relationship with Jesus. She understood that only she could open the door of her heart. So Theresa did... Theresa got out of bed and prayed. “[She] thanked Him for the gift of love He gave [her]” and decided to open her heart in a new way to Jesus.

Her new found joy brings me so much hope. In January, she joined the next level faith study and she “is happy because [she] wants to know more about how [she] can know Him more”. I asked Theresa how she feels having now discovered who Jesus is and how much He loves her, in reply she said “all I can say is that I am excited for what is to come...”

Special thanks to the 228 people who signed up to pray during the 168 consecutive hours of prayer! ♦

The STRENGTH of *Relationships*

During CCO's summer mission project Impact Canada 2004, I attended an outreach event that I was invited to by the CCO missionaries. The biggest thing I noticed about them was the immense joy they all had. I learned later that this joy came from their personal relationship with Jesus Christ.

Through relationships with these people, hearing their testimonies, and learning from them over the course of the summer, I also started my own personal relationship with Jesus.

Once Impact was over, I stayed involved with CCO and other Catholic youth communities within Halifax. I was part of a community of faith and strength, and I would need it to get me through the next part of my life. That fall, I discovered I would be getting laid off from my job. And in the spring, I found out I had cancer. The close-knit Catholic community was there for me. A prayer night was put

on to intercede for my healing and Masses were offered for me. One night in the hospital after my friends and I prayed, another patient commented on how great it was to see young people praying, especially while their friend was going through such trials. I witnessed to someone just as the young Catholics witnessed to me the summer before.

Through surgery and chemotherapy treatments, the cancer is now in remission, but it is thanks to God's grace and the prayers and support of the Catholic community I had met through CCO, that I have had peace throughout these trials. Through God, this community has made me a stronger person, and strengthened my faith. Sometimes it makes me wonder what this past year would have been like without the strength I get from my relationship with this community and my relationship with Jesus. I am glad God had better plans for me. ♦

No Call Too Late

While CCO was making a humble start at the University of Saskatchewan campus in 1988, God must have been planting a few more seeds elsewhere.

During the spring of 1990, God first made me move in the direction of youth evangelization. I was then a 43-year old music ministry leader, and certainly not a youth. It was a small, still voice saying something like: "You seem to enjoy evangelizing in your age group, why not get them started earlier?"

I only shared that call to a friend and I did not think much of it. I did not see any opportunity and ability in me. In a few months I was asked to direct a children's choir. Later, I became involved in children's liturgy.

In 1998, our pastor wanted to form a parish youth group and appointed our deacon to lead it. He called for a "youth meeting" and invited anyone interested. Since I was with the "Youth Choir", I thought it was part of my job to attend. That began the formation of a parish youth group which I eventually led after our deacon was reassigned.

Up until this point, I had never heard about CCO. When I first did, I thought

it was a small youth group in the prairies, reaching out to other youths nationwide. Two weeks before the CCO Rise Up conference in Toronto in 2005, I received an invitation to attend. But I did not go because it was then too late to organize a group.

My heart however, felt a call.

I bookmarked the CCO website and somehow found myself browsing the site every time I logged onto the internet. I felt drawn to its pages and wanted to learn more and wished it had more pages of information.

One day I clicked on the "Join our Staff" page. I thought, "I am currently unemployed, not looking for a secular job and I dearly wanted to serve the Lord more directly for the rest of my life, why not?" I filled in the form, and added a comment: "I am 58 years old..." The reply came swiftly, with a response: "Maybe you are an answer to our prayer, we have just prayed for someone more mature to join our staff."

The thought of joining CCO staff borders on the outlandish. It will mean that I will have to move to a place I have never been before (Saskatoon, Saskatchewan), leave my family, friends and church ministries behind, work with people I have never met and are decades younger than myself, sell my small business, live on a very small budget and work on some-

thing I have never done before.

The following months of discernment came like a single track pointing towards me joining the CCO staff. Both my wife and my pastor said the same words to me (not "Are you nuts?" as I anticipated they would). They both said: "I think you are being called by God".

Over the last few months with CCO, God continues touching my heart with changed lives and converted souls. Work was not exactly what I had envisioned. It is better. The people I work with are quality God-centered people. They are all hard working, self sacrificing, and prayerful.

Pope John Paul II called for a New Evangelization. I sincerely feel I can only answer that call, if I too become new. Life with CCO is built on love and is new every morning ♦

The Harvest is Plenty

“(Jesus) said to them, ‘The harvest is plentiful but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest. Go on your way.’” (Luke 10:2)

This small bit of Scripture has been tugging at my heart for just over a year because God has been tugging on my soul more and more strongly since first encountering Catholic Christian Outreach in 2001.

Since becoming involved in CCO I have seen major changes in my life, not the least of which is the one marked by my decision to join CCO Staff. After a frosh year very typical of a first-year university student, I was dissatisfied with the lifestyle of myself and my peers, and began to recognize a crucial fault in all of our lives, one which was not being filled even with all our worldly efforts. I recognized a sadness, a lack of purpose and an underlying yearning in myself and in my friends. During the summer of 2002 I undertook a mission trip with CCO for WYD. After 20 years of going to mass and being involved at my parish and Catholic school I found myself finally, in a real and life-changing way accepting the Gospel and a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. The Gospel had been proclaimed in a simple way which

made me recognize that what was missing in my life was a relationship with my Creator and Redeemer.

Over the next couple of years, I became more heavily involved with CCO’s activities on campus, where through taking and leading faith studies, and being trusted with responsibility, I was equipped to live my faith and explain it to those around me. I was challenged to live a holy life, to excel and to lead. I was commissioned to go out and to change the world.

Through all this I struggled with living in and coming to grips with the condition of the generation into which I was born. My greatest fear is not what may happen to me as I grow older, but what will happen to my peers and my friends. Across Canada and the world the young and university aged people are increasingly turning to drugs, alcohol and risky sexual behavior to satisfy their desires and quench their loneliness. These and other indicators are all signs of the need for change.

Last year I moved to Halifax to help CCO found the movement at Dalhousie

University and found myself in my last year of University, wondering and praying what to do next. My heart cries out to see change in my generation and those to come, but how would I participate in this? I studied History and asked myself what career I could choose to attain my goals. Should I be a teacher, trying to teach good conduct and maybe the meaning of life? Should I be a politician, and work to try and create an environment in Canada that might help those in need? I finally asked God to help me to come to a decision that would allow me to aid in a significant change in my generation. He brought me to discover those people who had effected the most important and lasting changes in lives, in hearts and in history. “Shouldn’t you be an apostle?” He asked.

I now know why that scripture has tugged on my heart, because now I will be asking the Lord of the harvest to send out more laborers. I will be asking Him to help me to Proclaim to Equip and to Commission others to go out and work in the harvest. I know that it is only through His help, through coming to know Him personally and exhorting others to do the same that my generation can, and will find not “what”, but “who” they are really looking for: Jesus. ♦
